## BLOCK PARTY

Patchwork Tulip Quilt Block due May meeting
Block is $91 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
This traditional patchwork tulip block is made up of eight half square triangle units, plus a combination of squares and rectangles. It is not difficult to assemble, but do be careful to place the tulips' center bud in the correct position.

This is going to be of 1930's fabrics with white on white
 background.

Cutting instructions:

Flower color-cut $4 \quad 21 / 2$ " squares
cut $427 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ squares for H.S.T.
Flower bud--- cut $5 \quad 11 / 2$ " squares bud and center of block a color that goes with your flower

White--- cut $427 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ squares for H.S.T.
cut $4 \quad 1 \frac{1}{2}$ " squares
cut $411 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ top of tulip center
cut $411 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 4 \frac{1}{1} 2^{\prime \prime}$ for sashing
Take $27 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ flower color and white make Half square triangles. Square to $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. Need 8 HST.

Sew $11 / 2$ " bud color to white $11 / 2$ "
Sew this piece to $1 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime} \times 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. See picture.

Sew half square triangle to bud square just completed.
Sew $21 / 2$ " square to half square triangle. Complete all four flowers.


Sew sashing strips to flowers.
Sew sashing to center $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ center square.


## Monthly Block Party Information:

This is a monthly challenge with a new block pattern each month printed in the newsletter.
There are several ways to participate:

1. You can make the block and bring it to the next meeting. Each month a name is drawn for the winner of the blocks that month. You can only get the number of blocks that people participate that month.
2. If you are like me and never win anything, we have started a group of twelve that make blocks each month. At the end of the year we have a drawing to win one set of 12 blocks. This is a good way to make friends, make something new, and maybe have 12 blocks ready to make a quilt.
3. If you do not want to win blocks, make the block in Red, White and Blue each month to be donated to someone to make Wounded Warrior quilts.
4. You can make the same block to donate to the Ronald McDonald House project.
5. You can also make nine patch blocks to be donated to Project Linus.

Made for husband and wife who retired from teaching

Blocks were from a 9 patch swap in a guild. Cut them in half up and down and side to side. Put smaller blocks in a paper sack and pulled them out randomly and pieced them.

Wanted to use fruit and vegetable fabric and the pattern Farmer's Market was just the one.
Changed the name from Farmer to Farmor which is Swedish for Grandmother, father's mother

There is a poem that goes "Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep. If I die before I wake, I pray the Lord my soul to take." In 1915 Gene Stratton-Porter wrote this revised poem in Michael O'Halloran "Now I lay me down to sleep I pray the lord my soul to keep. Keep me through the Starry Night and wake me safe with Sunshine Bright. Stars are made with glow in the dark fabric.

From the Quilt University April Newsletter-Guest Comment by Linda Schmidt
Have you ever helped set up a Quilt Show? I always help set our guild's show up, because I like to do it. I think it's because that drafty old building, with the beams showing and the tape on the floor and the rather dim corners, reminds me a little bit of that lowa cornfield that was transformed into a baseball diamond in the movie The Field of Dreams. "If you build it, they will come..." that old building says to me. It's hard to believe, when you get there on Friday morning, that there will be a full-blown Quilt Show up before nightfall. But somehow it always works out, and they will come.

Think a minute about why we go through all of the work to make Quilt Shows happen. In one way, it comes down to "fortune and glory" - we do it to earn money for our guild and to show others what we can do with fiber and thread. In another way, it all comes back to the deep down reasons we make quilts in the first place. Somehow, whenever I make a quilt, no matter what its pattern or fabric, it connects me with all the quiltmakers, living or dead, that have influenced me. When I start to stitch, I can see the faces of my Mother and Grandmother, and feel back home again. I can hear the voices of quilting teachers in my head as I work and, somehow, they live in my sewing room and guide my hands. I get the same kind of feeling in that old barn of an Exhibit Hall, as the frames go up and quilts are put on them.

I'm almost certain the spirits of quilters dead and gone wander through the aisles in the night before the show begins, just like those baseball heroes did in the cornfield. I can almost see them, fingering the fabrics in the vendor stalls, checking out the quilt backs and bindings, and inspecting labels. I can almost hear them say: "Well! In my day we never would have put pink and purple together!" or "Maisie, look at those tiny stitches!" "I do believe she painted on that quilt!" "My, my, where did she find that paisley print? I've got to get me some of that!" and "Lord, that old Nine Patch takes me back..." I'm practically positive we could see and hear them if we tried.

So we did it. We took our energy, our hearts and hands, our skills and time, and we put it all together in one great show for all the quilters - past, present and future - to enjoy. We built it, and - good Lord willing and the creek don't rise too much more - they will come. . .

And then, all of a sudden it was SHOWTIME - and it was glorious, wonderful, inspiring, and the people did come. Twenty-five hundred of them. We shared our craft; we quilted and demonstrated and explained and, we hope, inspired hundreds of people on to bigger and better things. We talked and we laughed and greeted old friends - we were even filmed for a television series on the Home and Garden Channel. And we bought stuff - you know, STUFF - rulers and needle threaders and fabric and notions and all the 101 things we need to have to do what needs to be done. And then, just like lightning, it was all over. . .

I could hear the fat lady singing as the last of the frames was gently lowered to the ground, as the last of the people picked up their quilts, as the last spirit quilter silently vanished, and the Exhibition Hall became empty and silent once more. It was a glorious, fantastic, show. It made me proud to be part of this marvelous group of caring, creative, artistic quilters. But, even though the show is over and the floor swept and the building locked, the quilts are still out there somewhere filling the world with beauty.

It was a growth experience, and I doubt we'll ever be quite the same again, like a rubber band that can't ever quite regain its original size. Our guild encourages our members to explore new ideas and techniques, to take classes and go to shows and share our work, and we did. We cut our fabric up and got it off our workboards and out of our stashes, into the empty hands and dreary places that needed a bit of comfort and color. We've grown to understand that quilting is an art and that we, as quilters, are artists. And when the show is all over and fat lady sings, when we hit that wall and wonder how we're ever going to make it over, when the road's too long and the burden too heavy, we just get out the old newsletter and find another quilt show to go to. So that when you build it, we will come.

## SUSAN G. KOMEN FOUNDATION MINIATURE QUILT SILENT AUCTION

Beginning in 1997, QGOA members and friends have been making miniature quilts to be auctioned at the annual quilt show. 100\% of the proceeds from the auction are given to the Tarrant County Chapter of the Susan G. Komen Foundation, whose mission it is to eradicate breast cancer as a life threatening disease through advancement in research, education, screening, and treatment.

In 2003, a Pink Challenge category was added by then chairman, Nancy Martinson, now titled "Nancy's Pink Challenge." Nancy lost her battle with breast cancer in 2004. The Pink Challenge is held each year in her memory. These are miniatures with $3^{\prime \prime}$ blocks. The other miniatures' auction requires 4" blocks.

The membership will vote on the quilts submitted for the Nancy's Pink Challenge at the April general meeting. It would be great to have a big auction with lots of 4 " block miniatures and Nancy's Pink Challenge 3" miniature quilts this year. We had 23 last year, so let's get busy and top that!

Rules for the Quilt Categories:
Miniature Quilt - To be donated for the Susan G. Komen silent auction. No block may be larger than 4" square, either machine or hand quilted. Must have at least 9 blocks, unless it is a whole cloth or medallion style quilt. Quilt not to exceed 24 " on any one side.

Nancy's Pink Challenge Miniature Quilt - To be donated for the Susan G. Komen silent auction. Quilt not to exceed 24 " on any one side. $75 \%$ of the quilt must be PINK. No block may be larger than 3 " square. Must have at least 9 blocks, either machine or hand quilted. No medallion quilt qualifies for this category unless medallion is 3 " and includes 9 other 3 " blocks. No whole cloth quilt qualifies for this category.

## Golden Spool

We are still taking nominations for Golden Spool. We will award the next Golden Spool in December. Turn your nominations in to Charlotte Humphrey.


## Memorial Quilt and Celebration Blocks

The Friendship Stitchers group is making a memorial quilt, which will be donated to the guild. Celebration Blocks that belong to past QGOA members who have passed away will be hung on the quilt as a way to celebrate their quilting lives as part of our organization. The plan is to have the quilt ready to hang at our 2013 Quilt Show in May. If you know of a deceased past member of the guild who never made a block and would like to make one for that person, please have it made and bring it to the April guild meeting. To avoid duplication, please call Jolene Mershon at 817-572-3825 or email her at jolenem420@charter.net, to let her know for whom you are making a block. The directions for making the block accompany this article. The block isn't hard to make and can be embellished or not.

Also, if you are a new member or a member who just hasn't taken the time to make your own Celebration Block, please try to do that. All of the blocks, that have been made, hang at our quilt show each year. This is a way for our guild to display our members past and present; which is very much an important part of our guild history.

The guild is trying to collect Celebration Blocks from each of our members. These blocks hang at our quilt show each year. We invite you to make a block also. Below are the instructions for these blocks.

## Quilters' Guild of Arlington Celebration Block



## Makes One Twelve Inch Finished Block

Please review all instructions before making the block. Must be a light star in dark/medium background, block may be no larger than 12.5".

Need:

1. FABRIC A $-4.5^{\prime \prime} \times 36^{\circ}$ - MEDIUM TO DARK
2. FABRIC B-2.5 $\times 2 \sigma^{\circ}$, plus $4.5^{\prime \prime}$ square - LIGHT that is suitable for name to be seen, no strong prints; 200 ct . muslin or plain fabric is suggested
3. Batting $-13^{\prime \prime}$ square
4. 13-14" square backing fabric
5. Binding fabric - two 40-42" widths of fabric, cut $2.5^{\prime \prime}$ strips, miter for one strip, double fold

## Cutting Instructions

"If you are going to heavily quilt, embellish or appliqué the block you may want to cut the pieces $4.5^{\prime \prime} \times 5$ ", then square up block to $12.5^{\prime \prime}$. Be careful to put star poirts on $4.5^{\prime \prime}$ side.

1. Cut $8^{*}-4.5^{\prime \prime}$ squares of medium to dark fabric -FABRIC $A$

If using a fat quarter, cut along short side (18) must be at least $18^{\circ}$; two strips of $4.5^{\prime \prime}$.
This will allow for $13^{\prime \prime}$ square for backing.
2. Out $1^{*}-4.5^{\prime \prime}$ square light fabric -FABRIC B You may wish to embroider your name and 'Member Since' line before constructing the block
3. Cut $8-2.5^{\prime \prime}$ squares of same light fabric -FABRIC B
4. Out 1-13-14 "square of backing fabric, may be same as A or different
5. Cut two $3^{\prime \prime}$ squares of either your backing or binding material, for 'hanging corners'
6. Out $1-13$ " square batting
7. Cut two (2) widths of fabric ( $40-42^{\circ}$ ) cut $2.5^{\circ}$ strips for binding.

Assembling Block-sew all seams with $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ accurate seam width


1. The star points are made using the stitch and flip method: Place $a 2.5^{\circ}$ sq. of fabric B in the comer of A with the right sides of the fabrics facing each other. With a pencil and ruler, mark a diagonal line on B from the corner to comer as shown. Sew on the line.
2. Trim patch $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from sewn line. Press it gertly to corner.
3. Repeat with another B patch on adjacent comer to create star poirts. Make total of 4 matching units for each of the star point units.
4. Join the matching units into rows with A patches as shown above; press the seams allowances toward the A's; middle row to B patch. Sew the rows together to complete the star block.

## Finish

1. Quilt the dock You may embelish and quilt as desired to personalize your block! It cannot be larger than $12.5^{\prime \prime}$ square, so do nothing to extend size or 'dangle' off block.
2. Please make two 'hanging comers', see below for instructions.
3. Sew on the binding to the block.
4. Sign block in at least $3 / 4-1^{*}$ lettering in middle of center square with permanent fabric pen or embroidery. Indude this line under your name. Member Since - fill in year you jained QGOA!

## Hanging Corners - Corner Triangles for Hanging a Small Quilt

1. Cut two $3^{*}$ squares of your backing or binding material.
2. Fold in half diagonally. Press.
3. Align the folded triangles on the back of the quilt to the TOP right and left comers, raw edges even. Pin. Double check you placed the corners on the top corners'
4. Sew on the binding in your usual method.

Blocks will be retained by the QGOA for future exhibits.

## NINE PATCH - Randa's President's Block

To be presented at the June guild meeting

This makes a $6^{\prime \prime}$ finished block.


Start by cutting the Color 1 (use the same
 bright for all 5 squares)
$2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 12-1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ (plus a little for squaring up) strip into five $2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares.

Cut the Color 2(tone on tone white) $2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{x}$ 10 " (Plus a little for squaring up) strip into four $2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares..

** Supplies List **
Color 1 Bright: one $2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 12-1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strip
Color 2 Tone on tone White: one $2-1 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 10^{\prime \prime}$ strip
