## More About Modern Quilting

The website of The Modern Quilt Guild describes Modern quilts as ones that are "functional, include bold colors, and are inspired by modern design. Minimalism, asymmetry, expansive negative space and alternate grid work are often a part of modern quilt compositions, as are improvisational piecing and solid fabrics."

The Modern Quilt Guild website lists a few guiding principles that are beginning to emerge in the modern quilt movement. These are:

- Make primarily functional rather than decorative quilts.
- Use asymmetry in quilt design.
- Rely less on repetition and on the interaction of quilt block motifs.
- Contain reinterpreted traditional blocks.
- Embrace simplicity and minimalism.
- Utilize alternative block structures or lack of visible block structure.
- Incorporate increased use of negative space.
- Are inspired by modern art and architecture.
- Frequently use improvisational piecing.
- Contain bold colors, on-trend color combinations and graphic prints.
- Often use gray and white as neutrals.
- Reflect an increased use of solid fabrics.
- Focus on finishing quilts on home sewing machines.

## Learning A New Skill Works Best To Keep Your Brain Sharp

NPR broadcasted a story about keeping your brain sharp in our later years and they mentioned quilting. Here is an excerpt from the story:
Brain training is big business, with computerized brain games touted as a way to help prevent memory loss. But new research shows you might be better off picking up a challenging new hobby. To test this theory, Dr. Denise Park, a neuroscientist at the University of Texas at Dallas, randomly assigned 200 older people to different activities. Some learned digital photography. Another group took up quilting. "Quilting may not seem like a mentally challenging task," Park says. "But if you're a novice and you're cutting out all these abstract shapes, it's a very demanding and complex task." The groups spent 15 hours a week for three months learning their new skills. They were then given memory tests and compared with several control groups.
Park's research, which was published in the journal Psychological Science, showed that not all activities are created equal. Only people who learned a new skill had significant gains.
So how does learning a new skill help ward off dementia? By strengthening the connections between parts of your brain, says cognitive psychologist Scott Barry Kaufman. While brain games improve a limited aspect of short-term memory, Kaufman says, challenging activities strengthen entire networks in the brain.
There's one more important thing you can do to ward off memory loss: exercise. In one study, they found that just 45 minutes of exercise three days a week actually increased the volume of the brain. Even for people who have been very sedentary, Exercise "improves cognition and helps people perform better on things like planning, scheduling, multitasking and working memory."
So if you're looking to boost memory, there's reason to challenge both your body and your mind.

## BLOCK PARTY

## Greek Cross 12 1/2"0 (finished (12 ${ }^{\circ 9}$ )

## Fabrics:

Light (white on white): Cut Four 2 1/2" X 4 1/2" rectangles, Two $47 / 8$ " squares and cut once diagonally for 4 half-square triangles

Medium gold: Cut
Four 2 1/2" X 4 1/2" rectangles
One $41 / 2$ " square


Dark gold: Cut
Two 4 7/8" squares and cut once diagonally for 4 half-square triangles

## Assembly:

Sew the medium and light rectangles together and the dark and light triangles together as shown. Assemble the block as shown here.



## Monthly Block Party Information:

We will continue with the groups of 12 that make blocks each month as in 2013. At the end of the year we will have a drawing and each participant should win one set of 12 blocks. It is important that each one who participates makes every monthly block so that no one will be short any blocks at the drawing in December 2014. If you don't particularly like the blocks that you win, you will have enough to make a charity quilt. If you don't want to participate in the groups you may make the blocks in Red, White and Blue each month to be donated so that someone can make Wounded Warrior quilts with them. The blocks could also be made for the Ronald McDonald House. You may also make 6"(finished) nine patch blocks in child appropriate fabrics for Project Linus.

## Susan FitzGerald President Block for 2013

Materials: Brights and Black solid (no color in Black)
Scrappy Choice-cutting instructions
Dark Batik (a bright color) for Fabric A
Cut $521 / 4$ " squares
Cut $427 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ squares (HST)
Light Batik for Fabric B
Cut $421 / 4$ " squares
Black for Fabric C
Cut 8 2 $1 / 4$ " squares
Cut 4 27/8" squares (HST)

Presidents Blocks due in June


## Preparation:

## Half Square Triangle (HST)

Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on the wrong side of each of the Fabric A 2 7/8" squares. Place Fabric A $27 / 8$ " square and a Black $27 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ square right sides together.
Stitch $1 / 4$ " away from the drawn line on both sides.


Cut the square on the drawn line to yield 8 HST squares. Press the seam allowance toward Fabric A. Trim the HST to $21 / 4^{\prime \prime}$.
Stitch a $21 / 4$ " Black square between two HST blocks. Make 4.


Set 2 aside.
Add a Black $21 / 4$ " square to each end of HST units to make the top and bottom rows of block.

## 9 Patch Block

Lay out five $21 / 4 "$ Fabric A squares and four $21 / 4$ " Fabric B squares.
As shown.
