## Words from Our Guild President

#### Celebrate August!

When I was new to quilting I was given a weekend crash course on the Dresden Plate Block and how to Machine Appliqué with invisible thread. I got home and tried it on my own, I quickly came to two conclusions: one, that it takes more than a weekend to learn how to correctly Machine Appliqué; two, I hated this technique. I kept working on it and finished that quilt, but I never wanted to try Machine Appliqué again!

I've learned that sometimes all you need is a little critique and instructions to be inspired. On my first Shop Hop (back in the late 90's), I found a Santa Quilt that had pieced and appliquéd blocks. I came home and made all the pieced blocks and started working on a Needle Turn Appliqué block. Marlene Baker saw me struggling with it at a meeting and said "you don't know how to appliqué, do you?" I didn't know how to take that remark, but she did me a HUGE favor. She booked a program using hands on instructions with Betty Edgell and I've been on an 'Appliqué Journey' ever since.

Over the years I've tried every appliqué method: Back Basting, Broderie Perse, Needle Turn, Fused Dryer Sheet and Freezer Paper Appliqué. Debbie Rake taught a great class on Broderie Perse and the history behind it. Jolene Mershon taught Back Basting to several of us at a day retreat. Dorothy Koeritz showed me a tip on how to tie your silk thread to your needle so it won't slip out. It wasn't until Libby McDuffie shared her excitement about the P3 Design method that I gave Freezer Paper another try. I've been using the starch and freezer paper method for several years now and this June I took a class with Pearl P. Pieria of P3 Design. She's the guru of this technique and a wonderful instructor! The starching is a lot of up front prep work but it's my favorite way to prepare my piece for Hand Appliqué.

Janice Mowery, with the positive/negative pattern for Pumpkin Faces, got me all excited about trying Machine Appliqué again. Randa Dillon and Barb Cain, during the making of the 2013 Donation Quilt, shared several tips on how to use paper to stabilize a block. I learned from workshop instructors Susan Cranshaw, Laura Wasilowski, Ginny Eckley and Karen Eckmeier how to fuse appliqué pieces, and have practiced the Buttonhole, Blind, Blanket and Raw-edged Stitches. All it took was some good instructions and some tips and tricks under my belt to actually enjoy the Machine Appliqué process.

#### **Summer Guild Retreat**

Well, the retreat has come and gone. I believe it was a great success! Many people responded that the rooms were like walking in to a five star hotel. What a pleasant surprise for us all! The rooms with the exception of one at the end of the hall were spacious as was the work room. The tables provided for cutting and ironing were HUGE! As with anything new, there were lessons learned.

The rooms are windowless, meaning at night they are very dark. I found if we left the light for the shower area on; not the toilet area; it provided an adequate night light so we didn't walk face forward into a wall. There were separate lights for the vanity, toilet and shower areas. It was wonderful having control over the temperature in our room. Actually, we were given control over the temperature in the entire retreat areas.

Just because a chef is on duty does not mean there are gourmet meals. They were delicious, but not gourmet. Some would call them comfort food.

It is VERY important to forgo your pride and fill out the question concerning dietary restrictions. People were in attendance with heart conditions that needed a restricted salt diet. I only found one item overly salted, but if you're accustomed to no salt, a little is a lot. Once it became known, it was immediately addressed. Nobody had mentioned it on their questionnaire prior to the first few meals. Let's face it ladies and gentlemen, none of us are in perfect health any longer. There is no shame and it could be the rest of us will soon be catching up to the same restrictions.

A light weight cover-up would have been helpful. It is cool in the mornings and warm in the afternoon and evening.

The retreat is located on 1500 acres of farm land. The majority of our meat and produce was organically grown on site. There are also walking paths throughout the acreage we are invited to explore.

Yes, a snake was reported to have been spotted, identification was not made, so we don't know what kind; friend or foe. However, again we are on a 1500 acre farm. Snakes are to be expected. We are in Texas. So, heads down, watch where you put your feet! We have them in the city as well.

A poll was taken from the people in attendance. It was unanamous! Everyone would like to return to this location.

I would be interested in returning in January for our winter retreat. They provide a fire pit and smores bar that might be fun to investigate. Please let me know by email or text what works best for you.

## **BLOCK PARTY**

#### **Churn Dash 10 1/2\*\* (finished (10 \*\*)**

Fabrics: Greens

Dark green:

Cut two 4 7/8" squares then cut once diagonally for 4 half-square triangles

Medium green:

Cut four 2 1/2" squares

Light green:


Cut two 4 7/8" squares then cut once diagonally for 4 half-square triangles


Cut five 2 1/2" squares

Piecing directions:

Stich the dark and light triangles to form four "half-square" units and press toward the dark.

Assemble block as shown above

We will continue with the groups of 12 that make blocks each month as in 2013. At the end of the year we will have a drawing and each participant should win one set of 12 blocks. It is important that each one who participates makes every monthly block so that no one will be short any blocks at the drawing in December 2014. If you don't particularly like the blocks that you win, you will have enough to make a charity quilt. If you don't want to participate in the groups you may make the blocks in Red, White and Blue each month to be donated so that someone can make Wounded Warrior quilts with them. The blocks could also be made for the Ronald McDonald House. You may also make 6"(finished) nine patch blocks in child appropriate fabrics for Project Linus.

used imagination to develop the quilts from there. There are characters such as CleoCATra, CATtention Deficit, CATatonic, RoboCAT, Pablo PiCATso, CATtitude, Captain CAT Sparrow of the Pirates of the CATibbean, and others made by the group. Make time to check out this special exhibit and their other quilts at the Gallery. The Gallery Showing runs in concert with the last play of the season from August 21 through September 28. The play during the show is Beyond Therapy by Christopher Durang. Check out www.stagewest.org for ticket information. The Ol' Vic Gallery features fine, visual art from local, regional and out-of-state artists. Being selected for this show is quite an honor. Each year, several dozen artists submit their paintings, photographs, sculptures and more for an opportunity to be selected as one of the featured visual artists during the season. The Etcetera group is one of the few to be invited back and is one of the fan favorites at the Theatre.

**Anne Jones**' beautiful hand quilted Jewel Box quilt has been selected to



#### Ronald McDonald Challenge 2014-2015

We have chosen the fabric for the 2014-2015 challenge and already received the fabric from Lone Star House of Quilts. We have decreased the number of "kits" due to decreased participation last year. We will have 24 kits available (well, actually 22 since we will participate, also).

We are working on revising the guidelines for the Spirit of the Challenge Award. Hopefully, by the time we get to the July meeting with the kits, we will have the details ironed out. In general, quilts should be at least 50" long per side, square or rectangle. If intended for a very young child, it should not have any buttons or other detachable embellishments. All quilts turned in by the appointed deadline (to be determined) will be eligible for ribbons for 1st, 2nd, 3rd & Honorable Mention.

As I said, the Spirit of the Challenge guidelines are being revised.

We had some really great quilts this past year and hope to see more for next year's show.
