## Block Party 2015

If you want to participate, please sign up at the Guild meeting, or you can email me (kim.olmedo@sbcglobal.net). We need to have multiples of 12 sign up, so everyone is guaranteed 12 completed blocks, so encourage your friends to participate.

Each month there will be a different block, and at the end of the year there will be a drawing. Each person will receive 12 finished blocks, all of one pattern.

If you do not want to participate in the block party, you can make the blocks in red/white/blue for Wounded Warrior quilts.

Each month's pattern will be in the newsletter, but if you want all the patterns at once, send me your email address and I will send you all the pattern and directions. That way you can work on the blocks throughout the year.

February-Valentine's Hearts (12"finished block)
Fabrics: Light pink solid or pattern, darker pink solid or pattern

Light pink: Cut eighteen 2-1/2" squares for background Cut five 3 " squares for half square triangles

Dark pink: Cut six 2-1/2" squares for corner blocks and heart


Cut five 3 " squares for half square triangles

- To make half square triangles, draw a diagonal line on the back of the light pink squares. Place a light pink square and dark pink square right sides together. Stitch a $1 / 4$ " seam on either side of the diagonal line.
- Cut along the diagonal line, and press open
- Square the blocks to make finished 2-1/2" squares

Assemble each row, pressing pressing seams on rows 1, 3, and 5 to the right, and pressing rows 2,4 , ad 6 to the left.

When rows are completed, sew rows together.

## Donation Quilt 2015:

The 2015 Donation Quilt is a stunning display of color and designed a quilt that will become a family heirloom for generations to come!
"Friendship Garden" was adapted from designer Kim McLean's "Hearts and Flowers" pattern found in Kaffe Fassett's Quilt Romance book. The pattern was redesigned, pieced, and quilted by Nancy Spell with appliqué help from the Friendship Stitchers group.

The center medallion focal point heart is inset with scalloped, pieced, and appliqué borders featuring a "Reflection" motif. The 90 "x 90 " quilt was constructed using a mix of Kaffe Fassett's 100\% cotton fabrics.

Your donation ticket packets will be available from Susan FitzGerald at guild meetings. Please consider scheduling a time to sit with the quilt at various 'Sell Ticket' events during the year.

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Susan's President Block
    Pinwheel Block
(5 1/2' block to finish 5")
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Cut two 3 1/2" squares of lighter fabric and two 3 1/2" darker fabric. Mark a diagonal line on wrong side of lighter squares and place right sides together with the darker squares. Stitch $11 / 4$ " on each side of the marked line and cut on the line for four "half-square" units. Press to the darker fabric and square up to 3". Join the "half-squares" to form the pinwheel block. Block should measure 5 1/2". See Susan's note below for the type of fabric she would like.

**Fabrics can be medium to bright patterns that read like a solid or tone on tone patterns. Contrast fabric the same from white to cream color.

## SUSAN G. KOMEN FOUNDATION MINIATURE QUILT SILENT AUCTION

Hello Ladies, It's time to think about getting your wonderful miniature donations ready for the May 2015 Susan G. Komen Miniature Auction.

Some history on how it all started:
In 1997, QGOA members and friends began making miniature quilts to be auctioned at the annual quilt show. 10\% of the auction proceeds were given to the Tarrant County Chapter of the Susan G.Komen Foundation, whose mission is to eradicate breast cancer as a life threatening disease through advancement in research, education, screening, and treatment. In 2003, a Pink Challenge category was added by then chairman, Nancy Martinson, now titled "Nancy's Pink Challenge." Nancy lost her battle with breast cancer in 2004 and "The Pink Challenge" is held each year in her memory. The membership votes on the quilts submitted for the Nancy's Pink Challenge every year at the April general meeting. Only those quilts that meet the challenge criteria are eligible.

The miniature quilts sold in the silent auction are comprised of those quilts submitted for the Nancy's Pink Challenge and those submitted for the Miniature Quilt categories. An entry form along with a picture of the entry is required for each miniature quilt entered and the rules for the two quilt categories are different.

The table below compares the two categories.

| Miniature Quilts | Nancy's Pink Challenge |
| :--- | :--- |
| No block may be larger than 4" | No block may be larger than $3^{\prime \prime}$ |
| May be whole cloth (WC) or medallion style (MS) | May NOT be whole cloth |
| Must have at least 9 blocks if not WC or MS | May NOT be MS unless medallion is $3^{\prime \prime}$ and includes 9 other $3^{\prime \prime}$ blocks |
| Quilts may not exceed $24^{\prime \prime}$ on any one side | Must have at least 9 blocks |
| Quilt may be any color | Quilts may not exceed $24^{\prime \prime}$ on any one side |
| May be either hand or machine quilted | $75 \%$ of the quilt must be PINK |
|  | May be either hand or machine quilted |

## 2015 QGOA Quilt Show Information

Quilt Entry Form Due March 30, 2015
Quilt Due to Show if Shipping by April 27, 2015
Quilt Check in at Show is April 29, 2015
Limits on Entries: Each entrant may submit a maximum of five (5) entries, with a limit of 2 per category. Special Exhibit quilts and Donated/Silent Auction quilts such as: Ronald McDonald House, Susan G. Komen Auction and Nancy's Pink Challenge Silent Auction quilts do not count in this total.

## DEFINITIONS

The Guild defines the Maker as the person who made the quilt top. The quilt top Maker's status determines Artisan or Master not the quilter's status. If Maker's status is not known, such as a for a purchased quilt, use the quilter's Artisan or Master s status. Please list Maker as 'Unknown' on Entry Form. Artisan: If ALL of the following statements are true, you may enter under the 'Artisan' Division: never classified as a Master in the past; never have engaged in a quilt event or activity for monetary profit (more than $\$ 2,000$ in a year); such as never formally teaching quilting, quilt related or wearable arts techniques; and never published a pattern or book on quilting, quilt related or wearable art techniques.

Master: If ANY of the following statements are true past or present, you must enter under the 'Master' Division: have been classified as a Master; engaged in a quilt event or activity for monetary profit (more than $\$ 2,000$ in a year); such as teaching quilt related or wearable arts techniques; published a pattern or book on quilt related or wearable art techniques; or have won a Best of Show and/or lifetime total of two Blue Ribbons, or a combination of, in any quilt show. Two-Person Quilt: A quilt to which a person contributed ANY work in completing the quilt such as: blocks pieced or appliquéd, and/or was machine or hand quilted by another person. Entrant has contributed the majority of the work on the entry.
Group Quilt: Any quilt to which 3 or more people contributed ANY work in completing the quilt such as: blocks pieced or appliqué, and/or was quilted by others, either by machine or hand.

CATEGORIES AND DIVISIONS: ONE-PERSON QUILTS

The following categories are quilts made by one person. NO other person contributed ANY work in completing the quilt such as: blocks pieced or appliquéd by another; and/or was quilted by another individual, either by machine or hand.
Artisan Division
101. Artisan Pieced Quilt - A quilt larger than 60 " on any one side and is predominately pieced or patchwork, machine or hand quilted.
102. Artisan Appliquéd Quilt - A quilt larger than $60^{\prime \prime}$ on any one side and is predominately applique, machine or hand quilted.
103. Artisan Wall Quilt - May be pieced, appliquéd or a combination, machine or hand quilted.
Not to exceed 60 inches on any one side. Includes miniature quilts that are not donations.
Master Division
201. Master Pieced Quilt - A quilt larger than 60 " on any one side and is predominately pieced or patchwork, machine or hand quilted.
202. Master Appliquéd Quilt - A quilt larger than 60 " on any one side and is predominately appliqué, machine or hand quilted.
203. Master Wall Quilt - May be pieced, appliquéd or a combination, machine or hand quilted.
Not to exceed 60 inches on any one side. Includes miniature quilts that are not donations.

## TWO-PERSON QUILTS

A quilt to which one other person contributed ANY work in completing the quilt such as: blocks pieced or appliquéd, and/or was machine or hand quilted by another person. (If more than 2 people contributed to the completion of the quilt, it is a Group Quilt - 302, in Open Division below.)
104. Artisan Two-Person Quilt -Two people were involved in making the quilt. May be pieced or appliquéd, machine or hand quilted. The quilt top maker's status determines the division (Artisanor Master) not the quilter's status.
204. Master Two-Person Quilt - Two people were involved in making the quilt. May be pieced or appliquéd, machine or hand quilted. The quilt-top maker's status determines the division (Artisanor Master) not the quilter's status.

## OPEN DIVISION THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES ARE NOT CLASSIFIED BY ARTISAN OR MASTER.

301. Mixed / Other Techniques Quilt - Any quilt, made by one or two persons, which has used any or more than one of the following techniques and doesn't fit into the pieced, applique, or art categories. Includes: machine or hand embroidery, cathedral windows, crazy quilt, digitized printing, painted, redwork, whole cloth quilt, and yo-yos; either machine or hand quilted.
302. Group Quilt - Any quilt to which 3 or more people contributed ANY work in completing the quilt such as: blocks pieced or appliquéd, and/or was quilted by others, machine or hand quilted. This includes quilts created with blocks received in a block exchange.
303. Art Quilt - Made by one person; using their own original design; made with any technique or combination of techniques or materials used in a nontraditional way; either machine or hand quilted. 304. Theme Quilt - Any construction method but must denote the quilt show theme. The theme for 2015 is "Joyful Reflections" May be constructed by one or more persons, entrant has contributed the majority of the work assembling the entry, either machine or hand quilted.
304. Kits or Block of the Month Quilt - Quilt, made by one or two persons, composed of patterns and fabric, packaged as a unit for retail sale, either machine or hand quilted. This includes panels printed and pre-printed whole-cloth quilt tops. 306. Textile / Fabric Items - Such as: garments, tree skirts, table runners, dolls, rugs, totes, bowls, fickelsticks. Must be predominately made of fabric; made by one person.

## DONATION DIVISION

401. Miniature Quilt - To be donated for the Susan G. Komen silent auction. No block may be larger than 4" square, either machine or hand quilted. Must have at least 9 blocks, unless it is a whole cloth or medallion style quilt. Quilt not to exceed 24 " on any one side.
402. Nancy's Pink Challenge Miniature Quilt - To be donated for the Susan G. Komen silent auction. Quilt not to exceed 24 " on any one side. $75 \%$ of the quilt must be PINK. No block may be larger than 3" square. Must have at least 9 blocks, either machine or hand quilted.
403. Ronald McDonald House Quilt - To be donated to the Ronald McDonald House; not to exceed twin size, must be washable and have no buttons or similar items attached that could be accidentally swallowed by young children. Do not attach a sleeve. May include a matching pillowcase.

## NON- JUDGED DIVISION

501. Non-judged Quilt - Any quilt, such as a vintage quilt, you do not want judged but would like to have hung and shown, either machine or hand quilted.
502. Youth Quilt - Any quilt created by person aged 3-17, non-judged but will be critiqued. May be pieced or appliquéd and either machine or hand quilted. Tied quilts are allowed in this category. Others may contribute work to complete this quilt.
503. Novice - First quilt that has been entered in a quilt show by the maker. The quilt will not be judged but will be critiqued. No other entries are permitted in any of the judged categories, donation quilts excluded.

## NEW THIS YEAR—SELL YOUR QUILT AT THE QUILT SHOW

Entrants, only those that are QGOA members, will be permitted to offer their show entry for sale while hung in the 2015 Festival of Quilts. By listing your entry for sale you are agreeing that $10 \%$ of the sale fee will be made payable to the Quilters' Guild of Arlington. A separate sign will hang with the entry sign listing the price of the quilt. Those interested buyers will be directed to the front desk for contact information. You will not be obligated to sale your quilt, but please do not list the quilt unless you are committed to the sale. The show committee is offering this for our QGOA members as a service and also to educate our show visitors on the appraised and actual monetary value of quilts.

Sale of the quilt and payment will be done by the entrant. Please use safe practices in meeting and coordinating the sale of the entry.

## Getting Your Quilt Ready for a Show

1. Read the show rules and requirements carefully.
2. Double check the deadline date and note if there is going to be a limited number of entries. Be sure to sign the entry form if required after filling it out.
3. Make sure you put your quilt in the right category. Putting your quilt in the wrong category could cost you a ribbon. One person quilt means only one person worked on the quilt.
4. Make sure your label has the info that the particular show is asking for. I always make sure my label is large enough for additional information that a particular show may ask for. For my own information I note the size of the quilt so I don't have to measure repeatedly for each time I enter it. Never use safety pins to pin it on...big NO NO.
5. Make a sleeve that gives plenty of room for your quilt to hang properly. A quilt that is fairly large hangs better if the sleeve is in 2 parts. This allows for smoother hanging in the middle. If your quilt is extra- long, usually over 86 or 90 inches, you'll probably have to put a $2^{\text {nd }}$ sleeve on several inches down from the top of your quilt so that the quilt won't drag on the floor and get soiled. Read your show instructions carefully for sleeve instructions. When you're attaching your sleeve make sure your stitches don't show on the front of your quilt. Don't just use safety pins on the sleeve either...another big NO NO.
6. Check your borders to make sure they aren't wavy. In the construction you should have cut and sewn your borders evenly and squared them. If they have gotten a little pulled out of alignment during the quilting process, block them. Lay your quilt on a flat surface and spritz with water...pat the border back into place...make sure it's square...and let it dry completely. The way your quilt hangs is one of the first things at which a judge looks.
7. If your quilt is dirty, wash it very carefully with a quilt-soap and dry it. Either naturally dry it or Air Dry it in your dryer. However, it's not necessary to wash a quilt before a show if it isn't dirty. But, it you have markings, pencil or otherwise...make sure all markings are gone.
8. Go over your quilt with a "fine tooth comb", front and back. Remove all loose threads, pet hair, etc. Use a lint roller or masking tape and go over every inch of the quilt. If you used a paper guide for quilting, make sure the tiny bits of paper are all removed.
9. Look at the delivery information for the quilt show. Most require a quilt to be delivered in a pillowcase or cloth bag of some type. Fold your quilt carefully before turning it in...it may lay folded for several hours with other quilts stacked on it before it's hung and you want to avoid as many wrinkles as possible. Folding in 3rds or on the diagonal are good ways to fold.
