Kim started quilting 30 years ago when she decided to make a quilt for her first niece; and, has since, made quilts for all her nieces and nephews, as well as for many other friends and family

members. Mostly self taught, Kim particularly enjoys playing with color and fabric selection. She recently led a small group through a year-long color challenge project, taught color theory classes in a local quilt shop and won top awards in our own quilt shows.

Kim uses her sense of color and fabric selection to create stunningly, beautiful creations!



Debbie Panton is a quilt designer who likes to travel through time and space. Her quilts are either based on a story in history or have historical stories of their own. During Debbie's 31-year career as an Art and Art History teacher, in her lectures, she would often illustrate a historical event with a quilt. She combines reproduction fabrics with antique quilt blocks and her knowledge of historical period colors and design. Debbie is the person that you would not like to take to a movie about Louisa May Alcott's book, Little Women unless you could ignore her "Tsk, tsk, tsk. That fabric was not used for another forty years." Once asked by her grandson if she enjoyed the Teen Titan movie that they had just viewed, her reply was "I didn't get most of the DC Comic jokes, but it was an interesting use of the colors pink, turquoise and black".



In Debbie's program for the QGOA, she will tell the stories of her original quilts in her presentation: An American Quilted Journey Through Time: From Abigail Adams to the Women's Right to Vote Movement.

Leo took Home Ec in high school, found himself to be a natural with a sewing machine, and learned to piece quilts. In college, he couldn't afford fabric, so he didn't quilt again until 1998, when he made a quilt to auction at his family reunion. He started watching episodes of Simply Quilts with Alex Anderson to learn more, but became bored with traditional quilting. He attended a guild workshop that taught portraiture quilting, took a couple more classes, and the rest is history. He is now a Master Art Quilter and teaches at quilt shops around the Metroplex and surrounding areas. His lecture will include a trunk show of some of his award-winning portraiture quilts.



#1 Open Arms Health Clinic





2021 Guidelines are the same as 2020.

In 2021 there are two types of Ronald McDonald House Quilts Challenges:

Ronald McDonald House Challenge Fabric Quilt Guidelines

- ♥ This challenge fabric is donated by Quilt Among Friends. Please take opportunities to thank them for their sponsorship.
- ♥ Packet containing the challenge fabric is \$5. The quilt maker who uses this fabric and turns the quilt in before or at the June 2021 guild meeting will receive a \$5 gift card from Quilt Among Friends.
- ♥ Quilts must use a recognizable amount of the challenge fabric in the quilt.
- ♥ Maker may use any other coordinating fabrics.
- ♥ The quilt must be washable and have no buttons or similar items attached that could be accidentally swallowed by young children.
- ♥ Finished quilts must be at least 50 inches on each side.

******Quilts must have an entry form and turned in before or at the June 2021 guild meeting.** Labels are optional. You do not need to add a sleeve.

Entries will be displayed at the October guild meeting and members will vote on them for ribbons.

Ronald McDonald House (non-challenge fabric) Quilt Guidelines

- ♥ To be donated to Ronald McDonald House any fabric may be used.
- ♥ The quilt must be washable and have no buttons or similar items attached that could be accidentally swallowed by young children.
- ♥ Finished quilts must be at least 50 inches on each side.

******Quilts must have an entry form and turned in before or at the June 2021 guild meeting.** Labels are optional. You do not need to add a sleeve.

Entries will be displayed at the guild meeting and members will vote on them for ribbons.

Packets are available at the general meetings beginning in November 2020.
